Proverbs – examples and questions

Some examples of proverbs:

The integrity of the upright guides them, but the crookedness of the treacherous destroys them. (Proverbs 11:3)

The LORD does not let the righteous go hungry, but he thwarts the craving of the wicked. (Proverbs 10:3)

Hatred stirs up strife, but love covers all offences. (Proverbs 10:12)

The wise lay up knowledge, but the babbling of a fool brings ruin near. (Proverbs 10:14)

Lying lips conceal hatred, and whoever utters slander is a fool. (Proverbs 10:18)

Like vinegar to the teeth, and smoke to the eyes, so are the lazy to their employers. (Proverbs 10:26)

Whoever belittles another lacks sense, but an intelligent person remains silent. (Proverbs 11:12)

Those who are kind reward themselves, but the cruel do themselves harm. (Proverbs 11:17)

Rash words are like sword thrusts, but the tongue of the wise brings healing. (Proverbs 12:18)

Doesn't try very hard to do well at school?


Who do you look to for wisdom? Why?
